Thoughts from Pastor Maureen

Recently I came across a passage from *Forgotten among the Lilies* by Ronald Rolheiser. He wrote: "We need a theology of brokenness. We need a theology which teaches us that even though we cannot unscramble an egg, God's grace lets us live happily and with renewed innocence far beyond any egg we may have scrambled. We need a theology that teaches us that God does not just give us one chance, but that every time we close a door, he opens another one for us."

In Acts 9:2 Saul is persecuting "followers of the Way." The phrase "the Way" is a very early reference to a group of disciples striving to follow Jesus' teachings. This first reference leads us to remember the persecution and challenges those early believers struggled with as they tried to faithfully follow Jesus' Way. Surely they failed at times. Surely they bowed to societal pressure. Surely they felt deep regret and sorrow over their failures. I'm confident that they believed in a "God [that] does not just give us one chance but....[continually] opens another one for us."

My friends, we have a God of grace. We are loved by a God who provides us with unending opportunities to follow the Way. Yes, there are times when we must suffer the earthly consequences for poor choices. But these consequences never separate us from God.

Bob, the father of four year old Sam, recently told the following story. Sam had done something that broke family rules and he needed to understand that the choices he made were wrong. As Bob put it, "Sam needed to know he absolutely could not do this again." So Bob put Sam on the time-out chair. Sam hated it. He sobbed loudly. But dad knew that this consequence was necessary for Sam to learn a

life lesson. Bob also said that he sat nearby waiting with Sam to finish his time. And when the time was up, Sam was free to leave his chair and resume his four year old life.

Sometimes from God's perspective we are like young children making bad choices. As a result we find ourselves in complicated and messy life situations. And yes, I realize that sometimes those messy life situations had nothing to do with our choices; that they occurred as a result of other people's choices. Whatever the case, that's when it can feel like we are "on God's time-out chair." It can feel like God is far, far away and angry with us. The consequences can feel like more than we can bear. That's when the final sentence in this quote resonates most strongly: "God does not just give us one chance, but every time we close a door, he opens another one for us."

Our God is a God of love; a God of grace; a God who provides a never ending supply of open doors for our benefit. Amen, let it be so!

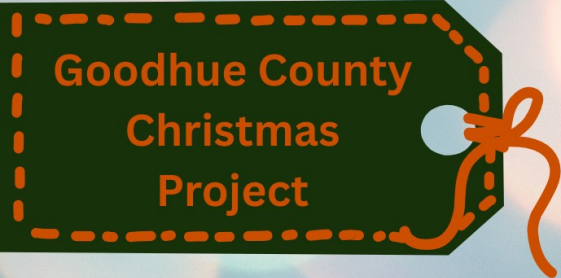
Valley View

MARK'S MEDITATION

Two Christmas Stories

December 2025

Soon, the youth at Vasa will present their annual Christmas program. I'm looking forward to it, partially because this will be the first time we will use the video streaming desk I constructed last spring. I'm not involved with the program content, but I'm pretty sure we will see Mary and Joseph, angels, shepherds, wise men from the East, and maybe a trip to Egypt.



The story our youth will tell is a "harmonization" of the text in two of the Gospels: Matthew and Luke. It is comfortable to combine these two stories into a single narrative; the result is easily digestible for young minds. But the two stories are very different. When we conflate them, we risk losing sight of a significant portion of what each author is trying to say. So, let's look at what can we learn when we examine the differences.

Both texts include a genealogy. But they are different. Matthew connects Jesus to Abraham through David's royal line; making Jesus thoroughly Jewish and a fulfillment of that prophesy. Luke connects Jesus all the way back to Adam. Jesus, says Luke, is a messiah for all, not just Israel.

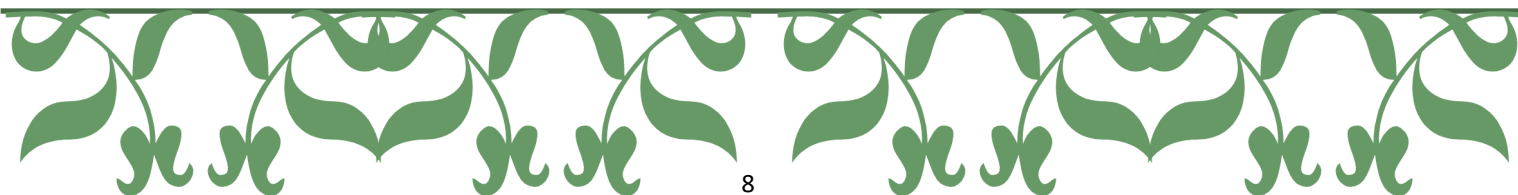
Notice also who gets the birth announcement. In Matthew, God speaks to Joseph in a dream, maintaining a patriarchal (Jewish) convention. Luke has the angel Gabriel speak directly to Mary, a young, unmarried woman with no social standing. Here again, Luke is widening the scope of Jesus' earthly mission.

Matthew wants to make the point that Jesus is the new Moses. Herod is a stand-in for Pharaoh. The "massacre of the innocents" is meant to parallel the plagues in Egypt. Mary and Joseph's flight to, and return from, Egypt is meant to parallel the Jewish Exodus. Jesus, says Matthew, is Jewish Royalty. Luke chooses to acknowledge Jesus' humble origins.

Finally, look at who shows up. Matthew brings in Persian astrologers, following cosmic signs, to proclaim who Jesus is. Luke brings into the story lowly shepherds. In so doing, Luke wants to make it clear that Jesus is the savior of all people, not just of Judea.

When we tell the Christmas story, we need to understand that this is literature, not history. In fact, the beloved nativity story in Luke chapters 1 and 2 appears to be a late addition; as Luke's narrative resets and starts over in chapter 3. Both Matthew and Luke have an important message they want to tell. To do so, they crafted stories of the nativity to convey this message.

As you watch the Christmas program this year, try to look past the stable creche; the angels, shepherds and wise men. That is just a story. Look to Jesus, in whom God is made fully human; born of a woman; one of us!

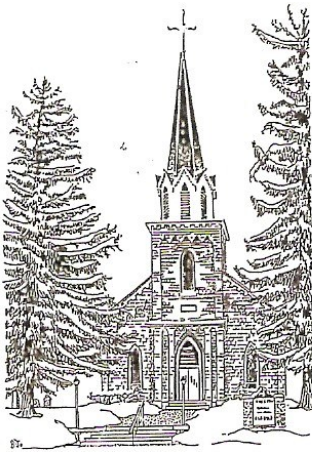
