Thoughts from Pastor Maureen

An estuary is the place where a river meets the sea. It is a place where fresh river water mixes with salt water. One of the characteristics of this brackish water is that its saltiness varies. The plants and animals who live in this environment have evolved mechanisms that allow them to tolerate the changing conditions. Another of the characteristics of this water is that it is cloudy. The cloudiness means that the animals that live in an estuary cannot see very far. If they are to survive they must adapt to thrive in muddy water.

Rev. Ortiz challenged us to recognize that we are creatures of the estuary. We are called to live in an environment that var-



MARK'S MEDITATION By Mark Hagen

The content of the Bible goes something like this: God created the world--twice. (First on a human scale in chapter 2-3 with Adam and Eve. Then on a cosmic scale in chapter 1.) Then we get the story of the Patriarchs: Abraham, Isaac and Jacob. Then the Israelites become enslaved in Egypt and God raises up Moses to lead them to freedom. It is through Moses that Israel receives "The Law." All this takes place in the Pentateuch; the first five books of the Bible.

Later, we learn of the monarchs (kings) of Israel and Judah. This is told in 1st and 2nd Samuel and 1st and 2nd Kings. (Then the story of the monarchs is repeated in 1st and 2nd Chronicles.) After that we get the words of the prophets, wisdom literature, and Daniel. Next comes the epistles of Paul, the Gospels of Jesus Christ, and Revelation. (In order of the chronology in which they were written.)

Sandwiched between the books of Moses and the books chronicling the Judahite monarchy are the books of Joshua and Judges. These books tell a story of the conquest of Canaan by Joshua and the Israelites. However, these stories are problematic. We read about the capture of Jericho by miraculous means. But, although Jericho was defeated and destroyed many times (it is one of the oldest cities on the planet), none of the archeological layers of ash correspond with the biblical timeline. The story of Samson is strikingly similar to the stories of Greek heroes like Hercules. It says that God "held" the sun still in the sky for Joshua. There is a passage where the men of Israel circumcise themselves a second time. (How does that work?) Finally, what do we do with passages that have God demand that Joshua kill or destroy every person and thing after winning a battle? (Joshua 6:17-21, 8:24-29, 9:24, 10:28-40, 11:11-23, etc.)

Although there are multiple places in the Bible where the events described don't make logical sense, the books of Joshua and Judges are the worst offenders. Professor Chauncey Handy says that when you read these passages you need to understand that the Bible tells stories about the past that are not the same as the past. The biblical author's goal was not 'let me tell you exactly how it happened' as much as, 'let me tell you why it matters to us now.'

This is incredibly important to keep in mind when sharing your faith. We teach our children a literal version of the biblical stories so that they can know and remember them. But if we stop there, we run the risk of losing our faith when we encounter these incongruities. As one Evangelical preacher said "If Jericho was not razed, how can I believe that Jesus was raised?" Many of our children and grandchildren have followed this line of thinking and walked away from the Church.

The bible includes stories of great battles won, wonderous miracles, and healing, not as history, but as signs (to use the Gospel of John's terminology) to give us courage to hear Jesus. As Christians, we are asked to believe what cannot be seen; to have faith that selflessly giving of ourselves will reap future blessings. This is not rational; it cannot be measured scientifically. Maybe that is why the Bible includes irrational stories like the ones in Joshua. They give us courage to believe in, and work towards, what Jesus called 'the Kingdom of God.'
