A Note on Communion Inclusion

As we continue worship under Corona virus restrictions I am deeply aware that there are members who are reluctant to gather in the sanctuary for worship. Be assured that Vasa will continue to provide recorded worship services for the foreseeable future.

What do we do about Holy Communion?

- 1. We will offer communion at every worship service so that those who are able to come to worship will receive the sacrament.
- 2. We are using pre-packaged communion portions for communion on Sunday morning. These portions are easy to transport. Call the church office and we will deliver portions to you.
 - a. If you are watching the Vasa worship service you may use the portions at the designated time.
 - b. You may also provide your own. Soda crackers, or any other unleavened bread are suitable as the body of Christ. Grape juice, or wine are appropriate for the blood of Christ.
- 3. As long as the weather is moderate, I will visit you, should you desire. Call and I will schedule a visit using appropriate social distancing precautions. We can sit on a deck or a driveway.

We cannot predict the future. Many of us fear that come late fall and winter, things will shut-down again. Then again, perhaps only those at greatest risk will need to continue with precautions. We just don't know.

Vasa Congregation is committed to supporting as many of our members as possible. It will mean new patterns and ways of living out the life of faith; but God hasn't changed. God is with us through these challenges and I am confident that we will come out on the other side stronger and more vibrant.

Pastor's Thoughts for August

Sometimes we need to look at something from a different perspective in order to have a new insight or experience a deeper meaning. Recently I had that experience with the sentence, "I am with you." God says this often in the Bible, but it's easy to gloss over it.

What happens when we rearrange the sentence and say, "With you, I am?" Try it. Say it slowly, and pause between the two parts. "With you.......I am." All of a sudden, the "I am" portion begins to resonate with more meaning. Instead of providing comfort we start to think more deeply about God's power in our lives.

Remember that Moses asks God for God's name at the burning bush. (Exodus 3:13-14) God's response is cryptic. God says, "I am who I am." Other translations say, "I will be what I will be." Either way, God simply is and God is not to be defined or limited or captured within boundaries or images.

When we consider the sentence, "With you, I am." we begin by personalizing God in relationship with us. To begin we hear that God is with me. As we continue to the second phrase our focus moves to think about the identity of God. It's not just that God is with me. It's that God is "I am." God is big, almighty, omniscient, omnipresent, wise, and all of the other adjectives that we use to try and describe God.

"With you, I am" your creator, your redeemer, your savior, and your advocate. "With you, I am" always, to the end of time and beyond.

With you, I am. Hold tight to these words,

Sunday School for the Fall Season

As we move into August it is time to give thought to Sunday School and Wednesday Evening Faith Formation for Vasa's children.

Education in the faith and knowledge of stories from Scripture are important. Under the current Covid-19 conditions and recognizing the limitations of our facility, it will be extremely difficult to provide a safe environment for our children and teachers. For this school year we are going to ask that parents take primary responsibility for raising their children in the faith.

Parents, you won't be alone. There are things that Vasa can do to support your efforts:

- 1. Families can and should come to worship.
 There will always be a message geared for
 the young as a part of our worship service.
 Children will remain with their family for the
 entire service.
- 2. At this writing a decision has not been made about how to provide learning opportunities for children. We are considering two options and will make an announcement in mid-August.



Save your Family Fare receipts! We're STILL raising money for Vasa through Direct Your Dollars!!

If you come into the church office at the Lutheran Center, you'll see a large pile of receipts on the bookshelf that have been accumulating since sometime last summer and right now there's about \$ worth.

Direct Your Dollars is a receipt-based program, meaning that we can raise money simply by doing something we all do each week – going to the grocery store.

Every time you shop at your local **Family Fare** store, save your receipts – and encourage your friends and family to do the same. Once we've collected \$150,000 in receipts from these stores, we can turn those slips of paper into a \$1,000 check for **Vasa**!

What's going on at the Ball Field?

As you drive past Vasa and turn toward Welch on County Rd 7 you may be wondering what is going on with the grass on the ball field. At the June 29th council meeting we heard a proposal from Deb Donath to convert the area into native prairie grass. Deb has volunteered to coordinate the whole project, with the council's approval. Herbicides have been applied to kill the grasses and weeds. In late November, ideally just before a snowfall, the prairie grass seed will be spread on the ground. Then we just wait until next spring for the grass to germinate and grow. No more mowing. No more chemical application. A bit of a warning: during the first year the grass may not look like much but by the second year we will certainly have prairie grasses waving in the wind. In planting a bit of prairie near the museum we will have a sense of what the Vasa Prairie looked like 175 years ago. This bit of prairie will also be a good place for insect pollinators which need as much support as we can provide.





What's going on with the Gazebo?

The steps and railings on the gazebo have been removed because they were rotting away and unsafe. Because of liability we needed to block it off and hang a sign. We are seeking bids to find out what it would cost to replace the gazebo and will report any new information to the council at their August meeting.

What's going on with the Air Conditioning at the Lutheran Center?

The new furnaces and air conditioners for the gym and the fellowship room were installed in April. We turned the air conditioners on around the first of July and are very happy with the results. The building feels much drier and more comfortable.





The Tragedy of the Commons Meditation for August, by Mark Hagen

In 1833, the English economist William Forster Lloyd published a pamphlet which included a hypothetical example of over-use of a common resource. This was the situation of cattle herders sharing a common parcel of land on which they were each entitled to let their cows graze, as was the custom in English villages. He postulated that if a herder put more than his allotted number of cattle on the common, overgrazing could result. For each additional animal, a herder could receive additional benefits, while the whole group shared the resulting damage to the commons. If all herders made this individually rational economic decision, the common could be depleted or even destroyed, to the detriment of all.

In 1968, ecologist Garrett Hardin explored this social dilemma in his article "The Tragedy of the Commons", published in the journal Science. The essay derived its title from the pamphlet by Lloyd on the over-grazing of common land. Hardin's paper focused on human population growth, the use of the Earth's natural resources, and the welfare state. Since Hardin's essay the term "Tragedy of the Commons" has been applied to many more situations where a common resource is exploited.

it seems to me this is exactly the problem Jesus is getting at in many of his parables. It is clear that acting selfish produces an immediate benefit to the person acting selfish. But Jesus says "Take the long view." Paul sums this up in his first letter to Timothy, chapter 6:


¹⁷ Teach those who are rich in this world not to be proud and not to trust in their money, which is so unreliable. Their trust should be in God, who richly gives us all we need for our enjoyment. 18 Tell them to use their money to do good. They should be rich in good works and generous to those in need, always being ready to share with others. 19 By doing this they will be storing up their treasure as a good foundation for the future so that

We have happily served over 10,000 FREE meals since we started 9 years ago!







Vasa VBS –Journey with Jesus through Holy Week


- VBS will be from 6:00-7:30 p.m. Monday through Thursday, August 24-27.
