



Thoughts from Pastor Maureen

I have a very fond memory of a specific Christmas program that I acted in as a child. In October of that year all the children went to various locations to have their pictures taken while in costume. There were sandy hills east of our home and that's where pictures of the wisemen on their journey to see the Christ child were taken. Mary was briefly seated on a Shetland pony, just long enough to get a picture since the pony was a little headstrong (wink, wink!). The shepherds knelt near a manger in an old barn. King Herod sat on a throne in a room with gold drapes as the wisemen visited him. All of these pictures were taken as Kodachrome slides and projected on a screen for the Christmas program. The children sang Christmas carols during the program and of course the congregation joined in. Those slides still exist and many of those children, now grown, remember that program.

I'm not the only one with those types of memories. Recently I visited Wendy Anderson and asked her if she remembered being in a Christmas program at Vasa. "Oh yes," she responded. Which costume did you wear? "I was an angel." Where was the program held; in the chapel or the church? "It was in the church." Clearly she had good memories of being in the program.

Vasa's children acted out the Christmas story for us on December 21st. I am sure that they will carry memories of wearing costumes, standing on the stage and singing carols throughout their lives.

The story of the birth of Jesus has been acted out by children and adults for many, many years. More important than wearing costumes and acting out the events is that all of the participants, but especially the children, learn the story. It becomes fixed in their hearts and minds. As followers of Jesus, this is what we want for our children: we want them to

know the story. We want them to know that God loves us so much that God comes to earth as a vulnerable human baby. Love is the reason for the season.

This message of love is the most important idea to carry in the days and weeks after Christmas. Not the gifts, not the carols, not the decorations, and not even the family gatherings. As Ken Bible wrote in the text of the carol *Love Has Come*, (ELW 292)

Love has come—a light in the darkness!

Love shines forth in the Bethlehem skies.

Love has come my friends and his light shines in the darkness of our world. We need this reminder every year and celebrating the birth of Jesus bolsters and encourages us as we step into a new year.

Faith Formation



MARK'S MEDITATION



The Cosmology of the Bible

January 2026

The beginning of a new year is a good time to contemplate the beginning of things. The biggest of all beginnings is God's creation of the world. What did the authors of Genesis and the Torah, the Old Testament prophets, Paul and the Gospel authors understand about the world and the cosmos? How should we understand terms such as "Firmament," "Seventh heaven," and "Sheol?" After all, it was not until 1543 that Nicolaus Copernicus proposed that the earth was not the center of all things. In fact, the Vatican did not formally acknowledge this fact until 1992!

The ancient Hebrews had an understanding of the cosmos similar to the other civilizations around the Mediterranean. They believed it consisted of three parts: A relatively flat disk of corruptible earth that people lived on, an abyss below; the underworld which was the silent abode of the dead, and a perfect crystal sphere above, on which hung the sun, moon and stars. The ancients believed that above the celestial sphere is the heavenly vault; translated in the KJV as the firmament. This is a solid barrier that holds back the waters above from the earth below. The firmament extends to the ends of the earth and connects the heavenly waters to the oceans. Likewise, the abyss below also contains a huge supply of water and is the reason there are springs and water at the bottom of a well. The earth



rests on huge columns. In the Hindu religion, these columns are giant turtles. When asked "What do the turtles stand on?" the fundamentalist Hindu answer is "It's turtles all the way down!"

This view of the cosmos brings order to our surroundings. Death and decay below; a verdant, living, but corruptible, earth in the middle; and a perfect heaven above where the throne of God resides. If fact, if you just climb high enough, you can see God. This is described in Exodus 24:9-11.

9 Then Moses and Aaron, Nadab and Abihu, and seventy of the elders of Israel went up [Mount Sinai](#), 10 and they saw the God of Israel. Under his feet there was something like a pavement of lapis-lazuli (sapphire), like the very heaven for clearness.

The gospel writer John apparently thought the Exodus account was allegorical, stating in John 1:18 "No one has ever seen God." But the Apostle Paul thought heaven can be seen, even visited. In 2 Corinthians 12 he writes:

"2 I know a person in Christ who fourteen years ago was caught up to the third heaven—whether in the body or out of the body I do not know; God knows.

Today, our telescopes, spaceships and mathematical models give us a different picture of the cosmos. Does this mean that since the authors of the Torah got this wrong, the rest of the Bible is also wrong? Absolutely not! The value of Scripture has always been its understanding of inner-space, not outer-space. This will always be true. Yet, knowing how the Bible's authors perceived the world around them is an important step in gaining this understanding.





